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York Town History Revealed

York Town A respectable looking village, published by the West Tamar Historical Society Inc. and edited by Jill Cassidy, has been a 20-year labour of commitment by co-authors John Dent OAM (*pictured*), Helen Phillips and Alma Ranson. Publication was enabled by financial assistance from various grants and benefactors along with fund raising in the local area.

The book covers more than 215 years of history in the Port Dalrymple area including the early history of the settlement of York Town, subsequent history to the present day and biographies of approximately 250 early settlers up to 1808.

The establishment of York Town in 1804, by Lieutenant-Governor William Paterson, was the fourth settlement in Australia after Sydney (1788), Norfolk Island (1798) and Hobart (1803).

Research for the book uncovered early records, sourced from London, that provided the names of all passengers on the early voyages, the full lists being previously unknown. Recently discovered documents also reveal more detail of the difficulties and achievements of the settlers and how they moved on to found Launceston, further up the Tamar River.

John Dent, well-known local historian and a foundation member of the Tasmanian Family History Society, is descended from James Hortle, a soldier stationed at York Town whose widow and children remained in the area after his death. John has previously written local history booklets and articles but, along with his co-authors, this is his first published book. With 470 pages, 8 pages of illustrations,



many maps and an extensive bibliography it is a great achievement and a valuable contribution to our knowledge of the early history of Northern Tasmania. - An hour or two a week to enter data from cards on to the database.


