Bring what information you have, and we will check to see if it is correct, before ordering. Please allow up to 5 weeks for delivery from the UK.





Kerry Lodge Bridge

In the years between 1830 and 1838 the highway between Hobart Town and Launceston was for the most part well laid out. Fashionable vehicles and rustic wagons were seen on large expanses of the highway. Accommodation was starting to be erected along the highway.



The main problem of this new highway was the need for well-designed and strongly built bridges to span the many gullies and rivers.

The first bridge to be built on the new highway was to span across the gully of Jingler's Creek situated on the outskirts of Franklin Village, on the top of Magpie Hill approximately 5 miles (8 kilometres) from Launceston. Lieutenant Governor Arthur authorised the erection of a bridge on the 23rd December 1833. The highway which included the new bridge was originally named the Main Road, then later Hobart Road and during the years of the 1930's the highway became known as the Midland Highway. The new bridge was named Kerry Lodge Bridge as it was erected on the property of *Kerry Lodge* which belonged to Theodore and Hannah Bartley.

A convict probation station was established at the furthest area of the *Kerry Lodge* property and it was to house the 40-60 convict workers that were assigned to build the bridge. These convicts were to engage in stone quarrying, stone cutting and construction of both Kerry Lodge Bridge and the realignment of the Main

Highway.

The bridge and causeway was built of bluestone masonry. It has a high single barrel vault across a deep gully. The massive facades are decorated with a colonnade of narrow pilasters, string courses and relief panels in the parapet walls. The copings are of random rough stones set on edge, unusual in Tasmania and particularly curious because at the time the bridge was built it was intended to have moulded freestone copings. The cost of the bridge included convict labour, the stone, lime and the cartage amounted to one hundred and twenty eight pounds seventeen shillings and four pence.

The Kerry Lodge Bridge is still in operation today and the committee of the Franklin Village Heritage committee are installing billboards and a viewing platform showing the history of the construction of the bridge and the surrounding area. The site of the probation station has recently undergone an archaeological dig under the guidance of Professor Eleanor Cassella (University of Manchester, England) and many local enthusiasts. There is to be more work done in this historic area.

Theodore Bartley arrived in Van Diemen's Land in 1821 as the tutor of Governor in Chief Lachlan Macquarie's son Lachlan. On a visit to Van Diemen's Land, Theodore decided to remain in Launceston and was granted 500 acres in the Breadalbane area. This land he named *Kerry Lodge*. Theodore became a substantial landowner, a progressive and a successful farmer. He assisted the community of Paterson's Plain/ Breadalbane area in both financial and farming productivity.

Jingler's Rivulet/Valley, was named after a convict known as "Jingler". He had escaped from a work party at Port Dalrymple in the very early settlement of George Town. Jingler found safe residence in the gully around the Breadalbane area and this gully was then used as a distance reference; eg, 'travel as far out as where old Jingler lives'.

John Lee Archer, Colonial Architect and Engineer of Hobart Town designed Kerry Lodge Bridge along with the Ross and Campbell Town Bridges as well as many important buildings in Southern Tasmania.

Lieutenant William Kenworthy, born in Lancashire England, belonged to the 48th Regiment and on arrival in Van Diemen's Land was appointed Inspector of Public Works at Port Dalrymple in 1820. During his stay in Launceston he was in control of the site construction of the Kerry Lodge Bridge and also supervised the

building of St Johns Church. He subsequently became the Warden of the church before returning to England on the ship *Arab* in 1841.

A story was told of Edward Gee (early settler of Paterson's Plains) who was riding home from the Carrick Races and put his horse at the parapet of the Kerry Lodge Bridge when he was confronted by bushrangers. Edward was thrown from the horse and received a broken arm as well as losing his trophies and money to the highway men.




