#### BARRIE ROBINSON, LAUNCESTON BRANCH TREASURER

Barrie Robinson brings another string to the TFHS bow, with his British ancestry and a background in teaching

He was born in Sheffield during World War 2 and in 1952 arrived in Tasmania with his parents and brother as Ten Pound Poms. He was eight years old on arrival and had already begun his interest in family history. Family has always been important to Barrie who has fond childhood memories of regular visits to his three great grandmothers. Now he is himself the proud great grandfather of a one-year-old girl, as well as his three daughters and ten grandchildren. The Robinson family eventually settled in Burnie where his father's carpentry skills contributed to building the Menai Hotel.

Barrie attended the University of Tasmania in Hobart and majored in Pure and Applied Mathematics. He worked in the Metrology Unit of the Department of Defence in Victoria before returning to Hobart to teach Maths at the Technical College, moving to Launceston to continue this work in 1979.

Barrie became Member No. 443 when he joined the Genealogical Society of Tasmania in 1981, and joined the British Interest Group as soon as he learnt of its existence.



He had already researched his wife's family at the Archives Office, and once in Launceston, began work on his own forebears. Barrie was the Library Duty Coordinator for four or five years then, when Betty Bissett retired around five years ago, he took on the role of Branch Treasurer. He currently manages the Branch computer system as well as transcribing screeds of genealogical data for inclusion in TFHS files. His work transcribing Northamptonshire parish records eventually led to his becoming County Coordinator for Warwickshire for the global project freereg.org.uk.

Barrie's English transcriptions have brought him back to his family. His current work transcribing some West Riding burials is spurred on by the hope that he will eventually locate his great great great grandfather.

#### **2022 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING**

Launceston Branch AGM was held on Wednesday 20 April at the Elderly Citizens Club, Invermay with 19 members and friends attending. Helen Stuart presented her final annual report as Branch President having held that position for the past seven years. Helen's report is attached to this newsletter. John Dent proposed a vote of thanks to Helen for her 10 years overall in the role as President. "She has done an enormous amount of work behind the scenes to further the work of the Society and we thank her sincerely for her dedication and enthusiasm in this role." It was carried by acclamation. Marion Sargent took the chair for the election of office bearers. Office bearers for the 2022/23 year are listed on page 3.

Guest speakers were Terrill Riley-Gibson and Barbara Rees. Also attending was Barb's mother Fay Ralph. Both speakers are direct descendants of Dalrymple Mountgarrett Briggs Johnson, the first living child born of Tasmanian Aboriginal and European ancestry and a granddaughter of Mannalargenna. Each speaker has followed a different path in interpreting their family history.

In December 2020 Terrill Riley-Gibson was awarded a UTAS Indigenous Higher Degree Research Scholarship specifically to research the life and voice of her matriarchal ancestor. Terrill has been researching her family history for over twelve years and is now using this research to inform her art practice, specifically by collecting ephemera from the natural world and interpreting her assemblages through photography. Terrill spoke about the rigor with which she approaches her research into the life of Dalrymple Johnson and her inability to prove many of the myths that have attached themselves to Dalrymple's story.





She also briefly discussed her research concepts, which include such terms as 'collected children', and 'interwoven', 'camouflaged' and 'un-camouflaged' lives as they pertain to both Tasmanian Aboriginal people and the lives of women within the colonial world. Terrill provided much food for thought, but now it is a case of 'wait and see' as Terrill has been approved to transfer her research project into a PhD.

Barbara Rees and her family became aware of their Dalrymple connection later in life. Her mother and father were committed to the Sherwood Hall Committee which manages the Johnsons' home at Latrobe. Sherwood Hall (c.1850) was rescued, moved to Bells Parade, and officially opened to the public in November 1995, the 150th anniversary of the Johnsons' move to the Sherwood and Tarleton area. Fay Ralph is an MTWAC Elder. The Melythina Tiakana Warrana Aboriginal Corporation was formed in 2008. The name means 'Heart of Country'. All members are direct descendants of Aboriginal ancestors from the country of tebrakunna, a region of NW Tasmania, and Aunty Patsy Cameron OA is a chief Elder. #### Workshop: Trawling Trove Treasures - Beyond the Newspapers

#### Presented by Robyn Gibson and John Dent OAM

Most family historians are familiar with the vast resource of historical newspapers digitised and available online via Trove, a collaboration between the National Library of Australia and hundreds of Partner organisations around Australia. However, people may not be aware that there is a treasure trove of other resources, apart from newspapers, that can assist with family history research. The main focus of this workshop will be an exploration of one of these resources, the Australian Joint Copying Project (AJCP) and how to access the records in that collection.
