## **Introducing.....**

### **John Dent OAM – Launceston Branch President**

Unlike most of us who came to family history in middle-age, John Dent began his foray into the past as a teenager, and it was family history that got him started. He remembers his father receiving a lawyer's letter about a share in an ancestor's estate, which listed the other possible beneficiaries – all of whom were related in some way. This piqued John's



interest and, with his mother's backing, he began exploring graveyards and interviewing elderly relations. From there, John went on to join the Genealogical Society of Tasmania as Member No.171 and to attend the inaugural meeting of the Launceston Branch.

Family history (his Hortle ancestors were at the North's nascent York Town settlement) led John further into research and writing – this time using his invaluable knowledge of local surveying. Through Ted Pedley he undertook work experience at Campbell-Smith, Phelps and Pedley and it is fortunate for us all that John continued in the profession, all within the same company – through the merger with Peacock, Darcy and Anderson, and now PDA Surveyors. On 1 July 2022 he retired as Director and Office Manager and now undertakes part-time consultancies.

John is fortunate to have begun training under the old system of chains and manual calculations, prior to the introduction of modern equipment and electronics. His knowledge of the Tasmanian terrain, his ability to interpret the often-cryptic notebooks of colonial surveyors and his love of maps, have all contributed to his second career as a prolific and wide-ranging local historian and volunteer archaeologist.

As the TFHS membership is well aware, John Dent is our new Launceston Branch President. While intending to continue the good work undertaken by all who have gone before, John is especially desirous to see the TFHS Launceston Branch in dedicated permanent premises. To this end he is heavily involved in the development of the Launceston History Centre (a vision of the late Jenny Gill and already an incorporated body with its own constitution) – a vision which will result in the greater cohesion of Launceston's history community, and a more effective use of our volunteer time.

## Trawling Trove Treasures – Beyond the Newspapers

Branch Workshop 15 June 2022

Nineteen members and friends attended our June workshop, presented by Robyn Gibson and John Dent (*pictured right*), which focused on the Australian Joint Copying Project (AJCP) one of Trove's many resources. Robyn and John walked us through the history of this amazing project reiterating, as most members would know, that Trove provides access to over 6 billion records about Australia, or of interest to the Australian community. Trove focuses on freely available digital content created, and held in, the collections of Australian Libraries, Archives, Museums, Galleries, University, Research and community organisations. However, what may not be widely appreciated is that within the *Diaries, Letter and Archives* category of Trove is the AJCP. The initial AJCP (1948 – 1997) involved microfilming, and paper handbooks to facilitate usage, of some 10,000+ records in the UK relating to Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific. Records filmed by the AJCP include a diverse range of material from UK Government departments, such as the Admiralty, Home Office, Colonial Office, War Office, held by the National Archives of the UK and County Record Offices. AJCP Online continued from 2017-2020 and digitised 8.2 million microfilm images, converted over 10,000 pages of descriptive text and provided online access to material previously only available through Libraries and Archives. Most, but not all, of the films are now available online.

Robyn and John outlined some of the resources within AJCP and, after participants enjoyed a welcome cuppa and chat, demonstrated some of the idiosyncrasies and traps for the unwary in searching the available collections.

At the end of the session, we were much more aware of how useful this resource could be in our family research. Handouts were provided and further assistance offered, if required, by contacting Robyn or John via our Branch Library.

### Exciting New Launceston History Venture!

*TFHS Inc. Launceston Branch is an integral part of the Launceston History Centre, which was formed at a public meeting held on 23 May 2022. Three Launceston history groups - the Tasmanian Family History Society Inc. (Launceston Branch), the Launceston Historical Society Inc. and Friends of the Launceston Mechanics' Institute Inc. – have been working together for some time to bring their activities and collections into one location, as each separately has issues around existing space limitations. 

### Did you Know?.....

*That the Tasmanian Names Index (TNI) now includes data, without images, from the Tasmanian Federation Index compiled by TFHS Inc. The Federation Index includes births 1900-1919, deaths 1900-1930 and marriages 1900-1930. The TNI also has data and images for records from 1920 - 1921 that will be ongoing as records fall outside of the 100year BDM access policy.*

### ***Have you discovered interactions between settlers and Aboriginal peoples in your own family history?***

*Ashley Barnwell, a Lecturer in Sociology from the University of Melbourne, is currently doing a national study that investigates how inherited family secrets, stories, and memories inform Australian’s understandings of colonial history. Ashley is looking to interview family historians who have found interactions between settlers and Indigenous Australians in their ancestry and who are doing some research into that aspect of the family story.*
